EASTER ALLELUIAS

Easter morning sunshine, and an impromptu reading of the Resurrection stories in all four of the gospels, leads to a joyful understanding. Read together, they seem a study of the women in Jesus' life. These are the ones who supported the mission band as they tramped the dusty roads of Palestine. They are the women who listened, who waited, who served, who wept.

Here they are, on this day of days, longing to be of service once more. They are confused, doubtful, and yet willing to be involved. Although the scoffing of the soldiers guarding the tomb, maybe even the eleven, is a concern to them, they are not deterred from carrying out their task of love.

Early in the morning they go alone to the place where their beloved Jesus lay. They do not know how they will move the stone. That does not stop them.

They will do what they need to do. Love demands it.

What amazement, fear, awe, wonder, grips them in close succession as they see first the open grave, then hear the frightfully beautiful messengers, "He is not here!" "Do not look for the living among the


dead." Living? The heart leaps! Living? He is living?! Now belief, exaltation, begin to drive out anxiety and sorrow. They run, according to Matthew; or leave silently, according to Mark...or stay silently and wait, as John tells us of Mary Magdalene. In actuality, I wonder, did they not each respond in her very own way, with tears, with running, with laughter, and with silent joy?

Bursting with their good news upon the grieving apostles, they are met with male brusqueness. Pure nonsense! Luke says. However, Peter and John do run to see with their own eyes. John, more quickly,

as he himself recounts, although he gives way to Peter to be first to go into the very place, "where he had been laid." Peter rushes in and stands aghast at what he finds: no one, nothing, only the burial cloths. Curiously enough, much is made of the fact that the face covering is laid aside, neatly folded, by itself. What hidden meaning does this have, I wonder? John's account of Mary Magdalene is also a puzzlement. According to John she went alone to the grave. So early in the day? Without an escort? Just to be near the one she

loved? Perhaps. It would serve a woman's need; just to be there.

Mary's encounter with Jesus, so unexpected when she believes she is speaking to a stranger, "the gardener," seethes with emotion.

"Mary," Jesus says. Who can fail to hear in this tender naming the fullness of love and encouragement: "Mary" and her breathless response, "Rabbouni!"

Here is life! Life in its fullness! This exchange of names; the encounter which says, "I see you. I know you." This recognition of unique personhood enters into intimacy of the purest kind. Adopt a Station of the Cross!!

Again this Lent there has been interest in friends coming up to the monastery to pray at our outdoor set of stations of the cross that were constructed ast year along the path that goes from the terraces o the grotto of Mary. Since Lent always comes in he Hawaii rainy season, we have come to realize hat keeping up with the grass and brush that grows so prolifically is a big challenge.

Dur solution is to offer an "adopt-a-station" program wherein a family or BCC cell group or Knights of Columbus council etc. can volunteer to ake over the ongoing maintenance of one of the 14 stations. This would include keeping the grass and weeds down around that station, clearing fallen pranches, and generally keeping that station's mmediate area clean and neat for the benefit of hose who come to pray the stations of the cross. We will develop a set of guidelines so that we naintain some sense of consistency throughout the whole set of stations

We are off to a good start as it happens that station #2, Jesus Takes Up His Cross, has been adopted by the Ron and Theresa Gochenhouer family. Station #4, Jesus Meets His Mother, has been adopted by Rich McGough (one of the men who helped erect the stations in the first place). So that leaves 12 other station still available for adoption.



The fifth station had a near disaster as a large tree fell around it. Miraculously none of the branches hit the cross and it was not damaged. Just a mess to clean up.

BY THE WAY...


Fr. Michael Sawyer will be celebrating his 90th Birthday (and his 65th anniversary of monastic vows) on April 11 this year. The celebration begins with Mass at 10am at the monastery. - - All are welcome!

Born and raised in Northern Wisconsin, upon graduation from High School in 1943, he entered the army. After basic training in Texas he was shipped to England and entered France at Normandy Beach on June 8th (D day + 3) with a replacement unit and joined the 9th infantry. He was wounded twice in France and again as they crossed into Germany.

After the war and two years of college he entered St. Benedict's

Abbey at Benet Lake, WI in 1948. He made his first profession Jan. 1950. A brother for many years, he was in charge of the dairy farm, thousands of chickens, and was monastery procurator at various times. In 1969 he went with 3 other monks from Benet Lake to their monastery in Pecos, NM. While there serving the Charismatic Renewal, he was ordained a priest in 1974.

In September of 1983 Fr. Michael came to Hawaii as founder of the Benedictine Monastery of Hawaii, later named Mary, Spouse of the Holy Spirit. Beginning in 1985 he was until recently spiritual director for the Basic Christian Community of Hawaii. He continues to serve in various ways.


