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## "Mary" Christmas... In Our Hearts

One of the most dramatic narratives in Scripture begins with the Archangel Gabriel making a startling appearance to a young girl named Mary. After Gabriel reveals to Mary the mission entrusted to her to be the Mother of God, she gently responds, "Behold I am the handmaid of the Lord, let it be done to me according to thy Word." Concluding this short exchange, we hear an ominous phrase that is

often overlooked: "And the angel departed from her."

Imagine for a moment a young woman is simply living her own life in a dusty, provincial backwater of a town with her own set of hopes, dreams, and aspirations. All of a sudden, an angel appears and announces that she has been chosen to be the Mother of God. And, then, following the briefestever explanation, the angel departs from her.

Mary is not given a plan for what comes next, nor guidelines for what is expected of her. She is not even given any words of encouragement. The angel simply departs.

In trying to understand how Mary felt during that moment I can only imagine thoughts of bewilderment, overwhelming angst, breathtaking fear and uncertainty, and, of course, extreme insecurity in stepping out of her comfort zone into the complete unknown. Yet, on the other hand, when Mary said "yes" to God, what did she gain for herself? And, better yet, what did she gain for us?

As the story continues, we read that Mary and Joseph came down from Nazareth to Bethlehem where Mary gave birth to the Son of God. Luke adds: "Mary kept all these things pondering them in her heart" (Luke 2:19).

What was Mary pondering in her heart? No doubt the journey from Nazareth, the rejection at the inn, the birth of her son, and the fear of the unknown.

As we enter into the season of Christmas we, too, gather our thoughts and prayers and focus our heart and soul on

and Savior. For many of us, Christmas is a time swaddled in nostalgia from our youth and an occasion to focus on family and friends, a time to get out of ourselves and open up to the grander scheme of life.

With an attentiveness to Mary during Advent and Christmas, what lessons can we learn from her? How can Mary inspire us to have an uncompromising faith, not just a conventional faith? She reveals to us a

Have you ever had a sink-or-swim responsibility thrust upon you without much direction or guidance? No mentor? No set of directions or manual? No Youtube video to guide you along? No IT guru to pull you out of a high-tech glitch? Remember, Gabriel departed from Mary without an instruction manual on how to be the Mother of God. I can't imagine a greater sink-or-swim scenario than that.

Recently, our monastic community here in Waialua has been blessed with the fullness of Christ, and the faith of Mary, in many ways - some large and some small. Tangibly, we have incorporated some beautiful cedar boxes into our gardens to grow fresh herbs for the community; we have installed speed bumps on the monastery property to keep ourselves and our guests safer from passing traffic; we have been gifted with a beautiful pond feature and stunning Hawaiian mural from the Artis family, and we have been graced with Br. Augustine's technical expertise and drone-flying skills which have improved our website and online presence beyond measure. Sr. CC's idea of a waterfall and pond with a beautiful mural of Kalaupapa has created a prayer and meditation sanctuary with a vision of aquaponics to be started soon.



With poise, grace and determination- despite the angel Gabriel not checking back in with Mary to offer any reassurance after his abrupt departure-she carried on nevertheless with a deeply rooted faith, a sense of trust, and with confidence that she was following God's will for her life. During this Christmas season we here at Mary, Spouse of the Holy Spirit Monastery encourage you to allow Mary to be your guide as we celebrate the birth of her Son and Savior to us all, Our Lord Jesus Christ.
