Both Damien and Marianne worked with the lepers on Molokai. Damien died of the disease. He loved, ate with, constructed with and hugged "his" men and women. He arrived a handsome young man and died as a leper.

Sister Marianne worked until her death with the young girls. We smile when we think of Sr. Marianne as being the Saint of Sanitation. She did not allow any of her Franciscan Sisters to contract the disease. She

was a most beautiful young Sister, but aged, as we all do, before her death.

The Diocese of Honolulu is such a blessing to each of us. Our Bishop Larry Silva is a fantastic follower of Christ. He is most caring and loving of his people. We are so blest to have him here in Hawaii.


the North Shore thanks to the generosity of Fr. Chris Keahi.

weeks of her life and the beautiful simplicity of her trust in God and faith in his protection of the sisters, priests and brothers now spread throughout the world as part of her order.


Msgr. was present for Mother's final hospitalization and shortly after her death and was involved in the preparations for her funeral.






