The Lord Is My Shepherd

Psalm 23 is the most beloved of all the 150 psalms in the Bible. It begins with the famous line, *The Lord is my shepherd. I shall not want.*

It goes on to compare God to a wise sheepherder who is completely dedicated to his sheep. Early every morning

he figures out where in the mountains the grass will be abundant. Then he goes ahead of his flock and leads them unerringly to a lush meadow.

He also remembers where all the springs are, so the sheep trust that he will always find them water to drink and a safe place to rest in the heat of the day. Even if they must traverse a dark and dangerous canyon, their shepherd will always defend them against a lurking predator.

Perhaps we don't like to think of ourselves as sheep. Yet we are like sheep in many ways. Whether we will admit it or not.

we do choose a leader whose ideas we make our own. As much as we try to be self-sufficient, there are bad times when we need someone stronger and wiser to guide and protect us.

Probably Jesus had psalm 23 in mind when in John's Gospel He says, "I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me" (John 10:14 NRSV).

One of the rewards of faith is that we learn Jesus. Through the power of the Holy Spirit working in us, in our prayer and meditation on the New Testament, we actually meet and get to know Jesus. We ponder how he lived and died and rose *for us!* We become convinced that He is totally on our side, concerned about us, wanting the best for us, and eager to help us.

As King of the Universe, He has the power to help us. As the human expression of the God-who-is-Love, He cares about each and every one of us far more than we care about ourselves. He is indeed our Good Shepherd.

This is our faith. We not only believe these truths, but through the inspiration of the Spirit we experience them.

Faith, however, is like a coin. It has two sides. One side

is belief. The other side is trust. We believe with our mind. We trust with our heart. The fullness of faith demands trust. If I believe that the Jesus who has been made Lord and Master of all things through His Resurrection is at the same time my Shepherd, who ardently cares for my welfare, then logically I should trust Him utterly.

When the angels appeared to the shepherds to announce the birth of our Shepherd, their first words were "Do not be afraid." The Good Shepherd is God's remedy for my fears. God does not want any of us to live in fear and anxiety.

Like sheep, though, we are small creatures in a big world. Life is tenuous and we are vulnerable. From the moment we are conceived we are subject to dangers of many kinds. Fear is our natural response. It is nature's way of making us aware of the dangers so we can avoid them. Fear, however, has a way of dominating our outlook and causing us to be anxious and negative about life.

God, of course, knows this. God is acutely aware of our situation. Why else would God send His Son to share our humanity than to prove to us beyond a shadow of doubt that He understands our needs and is present to guard and protect us?

The Christian faith tells us: *God cares!* With the strengthening of the Holy Spirit, we can keep our emotion of fear under control. The solution is trust. The more we trust God, the less we will worry. The less we worry, the happier we will be. The happier we are, the more hopeful and loving we will be. The more loving we are, the more we can alleviate others' anxiety. The more we can alleviate others' anxiety, the more peaceful the world will become. The effects of trust are far-reaching.

Trusting God, however, does not mean that our life will be all smooth sailing. On the contrary, each of us will have our share of storms, sorrows, insecurities and pains. We will all die. We cannot escape the human condition. Neither did Jesus. But there is a gigantic difference between trying to cope with adversity on our own strength alone and trusting that God will see us through it. Jesus is our

friend, our confidant, our ally, our support, our defender, our inspiration, our energy source. He is indeed the Good Shepherd. We can count on Him. We can lean on Him. At all times. No matter what.

So it is important for each of us to grow in trust. It is something we need to think about, meditate on, and try to practice all the time.

And that brings us back to Psalm 23. It may help our trust in God to pray this psalm daily. Another good prayer is psalm 91. Monks pray this psalm at the end of every day. It too is a prayer of trust, reminding us of what a mighty Shepherd we have looking out for us.

Whatever worries and fears we have, faith tells us that we can always put ourselves in the hands of God, in the hands of our Good Shepherd. There is no safer place in the whole universe.

Celebrating a Life Well-lived:

SR. ANN CIC, OSB (Aug. 23, 1929 to Oct. 24, 2017)

Sr. Ann Cic, OSB, (88) passed to the Kingdom at 5:35am on Tuesday, October 24, 2017, at the Wahiawa General Long Term Care Facility in Wahiawa, HI.

She was born in Denver, CO on August 23, 1929, to Anton Cic and Annie Hoffman Cic. Sr. Ann was preceded in death by her parents, and her siblings: Tony Cic, Mary Pacello, John Cic, Frank Cic, and Pauline Afshar. She is survived by her one remaining sibling, Eileen Copeland, 12 nieces & nephews, 14 Great nieces & nephews, 9 Great-Great nieces & nephews, and 5 Great-Great nieces & nephews, and her Benedictine Ohana. When she said that she was praying for her family, we never realized how many people were included in her prayers!

She was most grateful for her devout parents and family, her Catholic education, and the many priests and sisters who touched her life. She served as a religious sister for 66 years; 51 of those years as a nurse. She attended Annunciation Elementary and Annunciation High School, taught by the Sisters of Charity of Leavenworth, Kansas. She entered their convent and attended St. Mary's College, and there won a scholarship for academic achievement, opening the door for her Masters degree in nursing at Montana State University.

Some of the hospitals where she served included: St. Vincent's in Billings, MT, St. James in Butte, MT, St. Francis in Topeka, KS, St. Mary's in Grand Junction, CO, and St. John's in Santa Monica, CA, where she was eventually Head of Nursing.

She would say that the Charismatic Renewal in the Catholic Church brought her to discovering a loving God, which she experienced in Santa Monica, CA, and then Pecos, NM.

Sr. Ann transferred from the Sisters of Charity to the Pecos Benedictine Monastery, where she later served as Administrative Secretary to the Abbot, Secretary for the International School for Charismatic Spiritual Directors, and nurse for the Monastery and its guests. She was also involved in spiritual direction, vocations, liturgy planning, prayer meetings, retreat planning, hospitality and intercessory prayer. The transfer to the Benedictine Monastery of Hawaii in 2005, resulted in assignments as sacristan, bookstore manager, spiritual director and prayer companion.

Her health challenges in the last years of her life gave her ample opportunity for offering her pain to the Lord in intercession for the many who are suffering in our world today. Her favorite Scripture was: "God is Love. Whoever lives in love, lives in God, and God in him." 1John 4:16. She was able to write a Shutterfly Booklet: "Remembering... And It Was Good," in which she recorded her favorite memories and anecdotes.

Her Funeral Mass was the Saturday after Thanksgiving, November 25, 2017, at the Benedictine Monastery of Hawaii, in Waialua, on Oahu, at 2:00 PM. Her ashes have been laid to rest in the crypt below the Tabernacle in the Monastery Chapel.
